ORDER OF SERVICE



Preliminaries

- Guests and travellers are asked to please be in position by 0550hrs
- Invited guests are asked to please be in position by 0555hrs
- Pre-service announcements – 0555hrs

0600 – Service commences (Presiding Officer):

- **Acknowledgement of Country**
- **Opening (Invocation) Prayer** (Rev Briggs)
- **Reading of the Stand-to** (evoking remembrance of dawn at Gallipoli – and the start of the ANZAC tradition.
- **Hymn – ‘Abide with me’**

The Requiem – (Rev Briggs) words of remembrance for the repose of the souls of the dead.

Commemorative Address – (SQNLDR Campbell) words for all those from Farina who served.

Wreath Laying (Presiding Officer) – official guest wreaths to be laid will be announced, followed by a call for those other guests and travellers who wish to pay respects to come forward. The protocol is to come forward and place the wreath at the base of the memorial, take two steps back and pause before turning around and moving off. At the conclusion of the wreath laying ceremony, Anne Dawes will recite a poem for the fallen.

Poem for the Fallen – Ms Anne Dawes will recite the poem **‘In Flanders Field’**

Ceremony of the Last Post (Presiding Officer):

- The Presiding Officer will recite The Ode – all present will respond at the end of the ode with **‘we will remember them’**
- **The ‘Last Post’** will be sounded on completion of the Ode:
 - All present will observe one minutes’ silence following the Last Post
 - At the completion of one-minutes silence, the Presiding Officer will say ‘Lest we forget’ and all present will repeat together **‘Lest we forget’**.
- **‘The Reveille’** is then sounded and the National Flag will be raised to the top of the mast during the playing of the Reveille
- **The Benediction** – (Rev Briggs) On-completion of the sounding of the reveille, the padre will say the benediction prayer.
- **The Anthems** – (Presiding Officer) On completion of the Benediction, the Anthems of Australia and New Zealand will be played.

Cenotaph Ceremony Conclusion and Walk of Remembrance

Following the conclusion of the New Zealand National Anthem Australian National Flag will be lowered back to half-mast where it will remain until 1200 hours.

On completion of the lowering of the flag, the Presiding Officer will announce the conclusion of the cenotaph ceremony and invite all attending to take the **‘walk of remembrance’** back to the museum/café for the Gunfire Breakfast.

The Ode

The Ode comes from 'For the Fallen', a poem by the English poet and writer Laurence Binyon, was written and published in 1914.

*"They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old;
Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.
At the going down of the sun and in the morning
We will remember them."*
