The funeral took place at Healts ville cemetery on Tuesday marnin-and was largely attended by military officials, among them being Mesors Villy and Sells, of the Repatriation Commission headquarters. Mesars Bartrom and Hodgins, of the Victorian Repatriation Commonstan, Dr. McLennan, superintendent of Caulfield Military Hospital, and Dr. Porter, representing the medical section of the hospital. Every department of the Repatriation Commission and the Cauffield Rospital was represent ed. Before proceeding to the cometery a short service was held at St. John's Church of England. At the raveside Rev. Zerche conducted to burial service, and Patre Gates, hospital chaplain, delivered a short ad He referred to the services dress. Mr. Gill had sendered his country both as a soldier and a citizen, and regretted that such a fine and ap-right man had been sat off so carly in life. He said that no doubt death had been hastened by war injuries Mr. Gill had spent five and a hall years among the staff at the military hospital, and the fact that such a large number of representative men had attended the funeral was a proof of the high respect and esteem in which Mr. Gill had been held.
